







Cut 1 front inc. seam allowance. Cut 2 Backs with button wraps.




- Mark the middles of the front. (simply fold)
- Mark a line 10cm out from the middle on all four
- **∔** edges

The intersections will mark the middle of each embroidery and help with hooping



One at a time, hoop up and stitch out the embroidery (built in design 141601).


I hooped at right angles to get the patterns to turn manually but you can do this automatically in software.








Some notes on changing colours: This entirely up to you BUT if you are not certain of your own colour sense, look at what is dark and light already and stick to that. Also look at how many colours are in the original a limit your new palette. You can change the colours in the software to see what it will look like or just line the physical threads up in front of your machine. Remember; the machine doesn't know what colour you are putting in and can't complain. It also doesn't know if you're doing it wrong!



To finish Decorating the front, I cross hatched in different stitch patterns, so that no stitches went into or beyond the embroideries. Don't forget stabilizer on the back for your fancy stitches.







Turn to the inside and press 3cm down one side of a back panel. Turn that same edge in 3cm again. Top





To mark your buttonholes, divide the length of the button wrap (without seam allowance) by 1 more button than you would like. I want 5 buttons so I divide 45cm by 6. From the seam allowance, mark your answer (mine was 7.5cm) along the button wrap.



What you have now marked is the middle of the button hole. We need the beginning. The best way is to stitch out a test one on your machine first, in the same fabric, line up the test with the middle mark and eyeball the starting mark.









Open up your buttonholes, lay them along the other

Using your button sewing foot and program, sew the

button wrap and mark your button placement.

buttons straight over your marks, making sure they're centered in the wrap. Don't forget to drop your feed dogs.

Bobble braid, ric-rac, fringe, pre-made piping, custom piping, beaded fringe, pleating, gathering, mitered flat fabric, scallop fabric, lace, tassel trim, crochet...

At this point the front and back are finished. It's as easy as buttoning up the back, slapping right sides together and sewing all the way around the edge at the seam allowance. BUT I went ahead and trimmed the edge of mine. Here is a list of trims you can put on a cushion...



You can leave it plain too. Entirely up to you. Just make sure to sandwich it between the back and the front, pointing to the inside and lined up with your seam allowance.

I tried prairie points but have since discovered I did them the hard way, hence why they are not included in these instructions.
